The structure of *The Seed and* the Wind is simple, almost parable-like. Yet through the pairing of words and illustrations, the reader experiences the outward and inward emotional energies of the story. The seed, originally rooted in the land, finds itself connected with both the earth and the sky when it encounters the wind. This connection between wind, rain, and the gathering of natural life is significant. The tension between the wind's love for the seed and the seed's desire to grow is a theme worth savoring.

The use of color in this book is bold yet harmonious. Through depictions of flowers, trees, birds, and insects in the natural world, the book illustrates the invisible wind through tangible elements.

The text's shapes, sometimes structured and sometimes flowing in curves, add an element of fun to the reading experience and showcase the unique charm of visual storytelling.

This book is a beautiful exploration of growth, love, and self-realization, with a captivating blend of imagery and narrative.
